



B) 2 - Right edge of the right of two through lanes

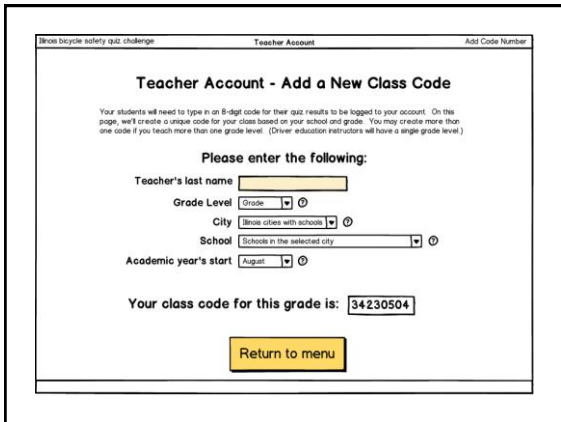
C) 3 - Center of right turn lane

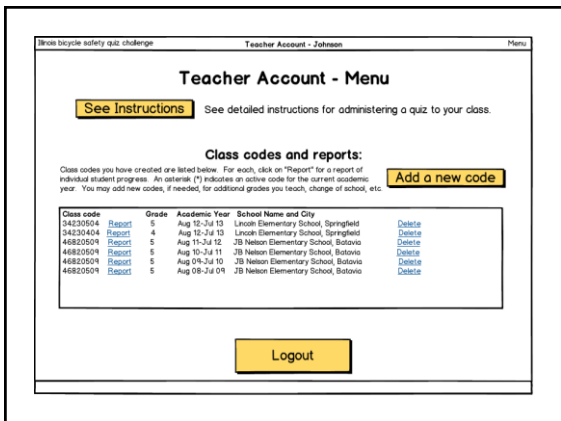
D) 4 - Right edge of right-turn lane, by road's edge



Incorrect *The puts you in position to have to make an unexpected and unsafe move across the entire right-turn lane, at the intersection. Using the rightmost lane going to your destination (straight) prevents this and allows right-turning vehicles to go (2) is correct.*
