NDRC GOALS

- Provide resources to help communities plan and implement disaster recover that is more resilient to future threats and improves quality of life
- Leave a legacy of institutionalizing resiliency planning across the country
- Leverage investments from philanthropic sources to help communities define problems, set goals, explore options, and craft solutions

SPECIFICATIONS

- NDRC is a competition, not a forumla distribution, based on the **Rebuild by Design** process
- Projects must address unmet needs from geographies most impacted and distressed by declared disasters in four categories: housing, infrastructure, economic revitalization, and environmental degradation
- Process must include robust **stakeholder engagement**
- Proposal must demonstrate **financial and institutional leverage** from community, government, private, or philanthropic organizations

REGIONAL APPROACH

- Cook County, DuPage County, the City of Chicago, and the State of Illinois are all eligible grantees from declared disasters related to precipitation and flooding
- These jurisdictions are developing a regional approach to resilience for a joint application




