What is Mobility Management

Mobility management is an approach to designing and delivering transportation services that starts and ends with the customer. It begins with a community vision in which the **entire transportation network—public** transit, private operators, cycling and walking, volunteer drivers, and others—works together with customers, planners, and stakeholders to **deliver the transportation options that best meet the community's needs.**







What is a Coordinated Transportation System

Systems in which the participating agencies, programs and organizations undertake collective and individual actions to reduce duplication among human service transportation services, increase the efficient delivery of such services and expand transportation access for older individuals, people with disabilities, people with low-income, children and other disadvantaged populations within their own communities

Healthcare Access Mobility Design Challenge

- Twelve teams across challenge areas
 - Access to preventative care, primary care, health education
 - Access to ongoing dialysis treatment
 - Access to post-hospitalize medical, rehabilitation, other to avoid re-hospitalization
 - Access to behavioral health





Required Team Members

- One Patient perspective
- Two or more mobility experts
- One or more local healthcare provider
- One ore more from public, private, nonprofits social services organization









Grant Descriptions

- \$25,000 each team
- Six-month grants (May-October)
- Use a design-think strategy
- Phase I May-July
 - Propose at least two innovative solutions leading to one solution





Phase Two

August-October-Begin with one solution

- Learn about solution-conversations with partners & potential customers
- Strengthen solution
- Prepare business plan outreach, marketing, operations, financial
- Prepare a pitch presentation describing your solution

Funding Ideas

- TCRP Report 129: Local and Regional Funding Mechanisms for Public Transportation explores a series of transit funding mechanisms with a primary focus on traditional tax- and fee-based funding; and common business, activity, and related funding sources. The report includes an online regional funding database that provides an extensive list of funding sources that are in use or have the prospect of being used at the local and regional level to support public transportation.
- **TCRP Report RRD- 60**: Characteristics of State Funding for Public Transportation A state-by-state overview of sources of funding for public transportation.

Access Report

TCRP Report 144: Sharing the Costs of Human Services

This two volume set provides detailed information on issues and potential solutions for identifying and sharing the cost of providing transportation services for access to community-based human services programs.

- Volume 1: The Transportation Services Cost Sharing Toolkit looks at cost and service data accounting needs and methods that lead to capturing fully allocated costs and performance measures for providing human service transportation.
- Volume 2: The Research Report summarizes all of the study components that contributed to formation of the Toolkit. It includes an extended evaluation of current experience and describes the regulatory environment that frames transportation service delivery requirements.

Think About Non-Traditional Sources of Funding

- Federal money, from the US Department of Transportation (5310, Safe Routes), US Department of Education (IDEA), HHS (Project LAUNCH) can support this work....but, what about....
 - Foundation grants
 - School- organization transit partnerships
 - Revenue-generating or cost-sharing programs
 - Vocational rehabilitation
