
Engagement process


Economic conditions and inclusive growth

Challenges and opportunities

- Region is a center of global commerce, but lags peers
- Many assets: infrastructure, human capital, diverse economy
- Less segregated economies more successful over long term

- Emphasize state policies and economic coordination
- Explore economic resilience and providing quality economic opportunities for all residents
- Strategies for economic clusters








Transportation infrastructure and funding

Challenges and opportunities

- Safe, reliable, well-maintained transportation network critical for economic success and quality of life
- Transportation network requires increased revenues at all levels

- Explore asset management and operations management
- Identify modifications to existing and wholly new funding sources
- Use performance based project selection to meet congestion, reliability, condition, safety goals





Biking, walking, transit, and freight

Challenges and opportunities

- Region needs more bicycle and pedestrian improvements, modern and efficient transit system
- Freight planning and investment should continue to be a priority

- Highlight innovative options to modernize transit system
- Emphasize importance of bike/ped planning and improvements
- Consider freight needs in project selection.
 Address grade crossings, intermodal facilities, planning for concentrated freight activity areas




Reinvestment, infill, and housing choice

Challenges and opportunities

- Significant development in transit station areas
- Housing diversity has improved but affordability is significant issue

- Continue to emphasize need to reinvest in key locations
- Provide strategies for areas that struggle to attract investment
- Emphasize market role in planning, development, and housing choice




Conservation, flooding, and climate change

Challenges and opportunities

 Continued development of agricultural and natural lands, and worsening flooding from climate change

- Propose conservation priorities
- Identify strategies for conservation and development in transitioning areas
- Strategies to create climate-resilient transportation infrastructure, employ green infrastructure, address disproportionate impacts of flooding on vulnerable populations





Collaboration and capacity

Challenges and opportunities

- Local governments under fiscal stress from local/state structural and budgetary issues
- Key issues include government inefficiencies, overlapping responsibilities, and duplication of services
- Strong communities required to solve regional challenges and support the region's success

- Explore strategies to build strong local communities, such as capacity-building assistance
- Examine intergovernmental coordination and collaboration, service sharing, and consolidation
