# Highway designations: key changes from recent legislation

Caveat: The following slides describe important changes to the highway designation process. However, the designation process and size and weight regulations have many exceptions and special provisions. Complete information about state regulations is available at P.A. 101-0328 or in IDOT's OPER 753 pamphlet (after 1/1/2020).



#### Public Acts 100-0343 and 101-0328

| Issue                                    | Prior law  | Law effective Jan. 1, 2020   |

| Signage for designated Class II highways |  | Signs designating Class II highways need not be erected, but such designations shall be reported to IDOT |
| Truck restrictions                       | IDOT and Local agencies may prohibit the operation of trucks or other commercial vehicles, and may impose weight limitations. These prohibitions and limitations must be signed. | Same   |

| Issue                                 | Prior law | Law effective Jan. 1, 2020  |
|---------------------------------------|-----------|---|
| Record-keeping for truck restrictions |           | <ul> <li>Local governments may report truck restrictions to IDOT</li> <li>IDOT shall post these reported restrictions on its web site.</li> </ul> |

# Changes in highway designation law

#### Key takeaways:

- New laws better align with municipal practice
- New laws will place greater importance on getting truck restrictions right
- With greater legal access for large trucks on local roads, there will be more importance on assuring those roads are structurally suitable for large trucks
- New investments for trucks may be increasingly important



## **Next Steps**

- Review and implement O'Hare study within new legal environment
- Designate truck routes
- Update truck restrictions
- Identify capital improvements
- Coordinate implementation and investment programs and policies
- Improve regional truck data
- Periodically reevaluate truck route designations
